
The Honorable Trey Gowdy / District 4



In the past three years, South Carolina Humanities has awarded more than 38 grants in District Four. The awards range from smaller Council Program initiatives, to Mini/Planning Grants, to larger Major Grant awards. Here are a few you may find of great interest:

- > The Upcountry History Museum received Major Grant support for two original exhibits that are currently on display: "Back Where I Come From: The Upcountry's Piedmont Blues" and "The Ripple Effect: How Saving a River Revitalized a Community." In its two years of display, The Ripple Effect reached more than 45,000 people with its story of the Reedy River, Lake Conestee, and environmental changes in Greenville. A variety of public programs have complemented each exhibit. (Awarded: \$13,203; cost-share: \$112,566)
- ➤ Converse College received grant funds to support the Okra to Opera: Converse Conference on Southern Culture in April 2014 and again in April 2016. Each conference highlights unique aspects of Southern culture through lectures and hands-on events. (Awarded: \$2,000; cost-share: \$28,900)
- Numerous organizations in District 4 have been recipients of SC Humanities' new Fast Track Literary Grants, including Greenville Wordsmiths for their 2016 and 2017 Saturday Writing Clubs; the Community Foundation of Greenville for the new young adult book festival Read Up; Greenville County Library System for their 2016 Southern Authors Festival; and Hub City Writers Project for the Writers Well Youth Fellowship Retreat. (Awarded: \$4,675; cost-share: \$90,512)
- > South Carolina Humanities grant funds have supported a variety of public programs in District 4 about the history and culture of the Jewish people, including **Greenville Technical College**'s **Holocaust Remembrance Week** in November 2014; **Greenville Jewish Federation**'s "**Testimony to the Human Spirit**" in November 2015 and "**Triumph of the Soul**" in April 2016 that brought three holocaust survivors to Greenville, and the **Spartanburg Interfaith Scholar-In-Residence Program** in November 2015. (Awarded; \$5,200; cost-share: \$27,352).
- ➤ Hometown Teams: How Sports Shape America is an exhibit from the Smithsonian Institution that examines how sports represent our communities and embody the American spirit. It was developed specifically for rural audiences and small towns that often do not have access to major traveling exhibitions. Hometown Teams was on display at the Slater Hall in Northern Greenville County from September 12 October 25, 2015, reaching 6,719 people.
- ➤ The Children's Museum of the Upstate received support for their exhibit *Hello From Japan!* and its related programming. More than 6,000 children and caregivers viewed this exhibit while it was on display from May 30 September 7, 2015. The exhibit gave visitors a family-friendly window into Japanese culture. (Awarded: \$8,000; cost-share: \$72,580)
