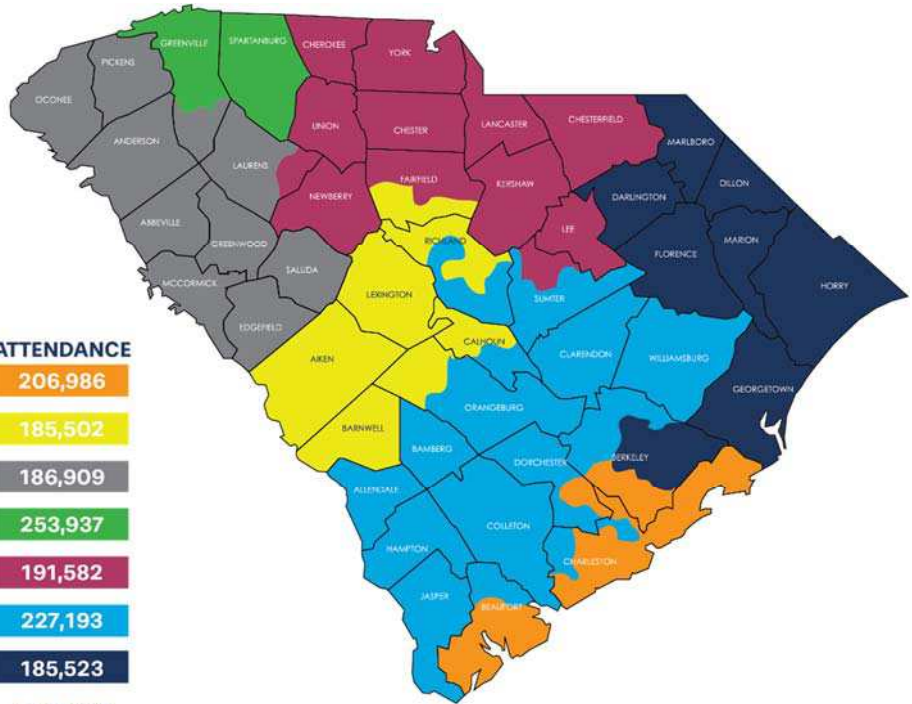

In the past three years, South Carolina Humanities has awarded more than 37 grants in District Five. The awards range from smaller Council Program initiatives, to Mini/Planning Grants, to larger Major Grants. Here are a few you may find of great interest:

- **USC Lancaster** received multiple grants to support a new permanent exhibit at their Native American Studies Center. “Share a Little of that Human Touch” will be the largest exhibit about South Carolina prehistory to open in the state since the South Carolina State Museum was established. The exhibit will have a grand opening on March 16, 2017 with special tours, lectures, and opportunities for students. (Awarded: \$9,723; cost-share: \$12,186)
- **The Newberry County Historical and Museum Society** received grant funds to restore an important historic monument in the Newberry Village Cemetery. The obelisk-like monument honoring Joseph Kerr was restored and dedicated at a special ceremony in November 2014. (Awarded: \$1,000; cost-share: \$4,900)
- **Hometown Teams: How Sports Shape America** is an exhibit from the Smithsonian Institution that examines how sports represent our communities and embody the American spirit. It was developed specifically for rural audiences and small towns that often do not have access to major traveling exhibitions. *Hometown Teams* was on display at the **Gaffney Visitor’s Center and Art Gallery** in Cherokee County from April 18 – May 31, 2015 and reached 4,529 people.
- Similarly, the traveling Smithsonian Exhibit *The Way We Worked* will be on display in the **City of Chester’s** town hall from **June 24 – August 6, 2017**. This exhibit explores how work became such a central element in American culture by tracing the many changes that affected the workforce and work environment in the past 150 years. Many collateral programs are planned to accompany the exhibit.
- **Allison Creek Presbyterian Church** in York received grant funds to support a special multi-faceted project about common ground and the history of the community surrounding the church, which includes two historic cemeteries and public trails. A public festival will take place in May that will include the unveiling a new historical marker and the screening of a documentary about the community. (Awarded: \$8,585; cost-share: \$15,000)
- Four communities in District 5 have been recipients of the new Fast Track Literary Grant opportunity, one of the new literary initiatives replacing the annual ^{SC}Book Festival in Columbia each year. The grants supported **USC Union’s Upcountry Literary Festival** in March 2016, **Newberry County Literary Council’s Big Read** program in February 2016, an author presentation at the **Cherokee County Historical Society** in March 2016, and a proposed author presentation sponsored by **Whitmire Economic Development Board** that will take place in **Whitmire and Chester** in 2017. (Awarded: \$7,400; cost-share: \$8,300)
