

In the past three years, South Carolina Humanities has awarded more than 33 grants in District Seven. The awards range from smaller Council Program initiatives, to Mini/Planning Grants, to larger Major Grants. Here are a few you may find of great interest:

- **The Franklin G. Burroughs – Simeon B. Chapin Art Museum** in Myrtle Beach received grant funds to support the creation of videos to accompany the exhibit **Rice and Indigo** that was on display from September 2015 – January 2016. (\$1,600 outright; \$2,000 cost-share)
- **Hometown Teams: How Sports Shape America** is an exhibit from the Smithsonian Institution that examines how sports represent our communities and embody the American spirit. It was developed specifically for rural audiences and small towns that often do not have access to major traveling exhibitions. *Hometown Teams* was on display at the **Georgetown County Museum** from July 25 – September 6, 2015, where it reached more than 1,000 people.
- Similarly, the traveling Smithsonian Exhibit **The Way We Worked** will be on display at the **Black Creek Arts Council** in Hartsville from **September 30 – November 12, 2017**. This exhibit explores how work became such a central element in American culture by tracing the many changes that affected the workforce and work environment in the past 150 years. Many collateral programs are planned to accompany the exhibit.
- **The Georgetown County Library** received support to conduct research into and oral histories about the Lebanese legacy of Georgetown County. This research is planned to result in digital collections, educational displays, and humanities lectures. (Awarded: \$830; cost-share: \$1,480)
- **The South Carolina African American Heritage Foundation** received grant support for a series of public programs exploring the history and cultural significance of the **Town of Atlantic Beach**, in honor of its 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary. (Awarded: \$6,000; cost-share: \$9,000)
- **Coastal Carolina University’s Athenaeum Press** has received multiple grant awards for special projects coming out of this unique, collaborative entity, including an exhibit titled **A War on Two Fronts** that was on display over the summer of 2015 and is now traveling the state. (Awarded: \$2,000; cost-share: \$21,770)
- **The Belle W. Baruch Foundation** at Hobcaw Barony has received two grants to support content creation for the **Between the Waters** interpretive, interactive website and associated public programs. The impressive website is now live at [www.betweenthewaters.org](http://www.betweenthewaters.org). (Awarded: \$6,850; cost-share: \$36,440)

**\*\*Note:** The attendance numbers will increase with receipt of final reports for projects in 2015 and 2016 and with the completion of unfinished media projects.
